

AWARD FOR OUTSTANDING SERVICE TO THE CAMPUS COMMUNITY

This Award acknowledges outstanding contributions to the life of the campus community. It recognises staff and visiting fellows who have volunteered their time, expertise, skills and knowledge and who have demonstrated exceptional dedication and service to the campus community beyond the normal expectations of their position.

NB: In 2004 this award was called the University Medal for Outstanding Service to the Campus Community.

Dr Richard Barwick

Since his appointment as a lecturer in Zoology in 1959, Richard Barwick's contributions to the University have been outstanding. In addition to his teaching and research responsibilities, for almost 45 years Richard Barwick has generously volunteered his time, expertise and skills to assist staff and students of the University.

Dr Barwick's contributions include serving on the University's Buildings and Grounds Committee for 17 years and assisting Professor Lindsay Prior to develop the campus flora and fauna policies. He was also the first Deputy Warden of Bruce Hall in the early 1960s, the Keeper of the Cellars at University House for six years and a member of the Governing Body and the Stewards' Committee. Dr Barwick was also a Member of the Editorial Board of the ANU Press for nearly 10 years. He has generously volunteered his artistic and graphic design skills to students and staff for countless publications, including for every issues of the *Aboriginal History* Journal for nearly 30 years.

Richard Barwick has also made a significant contribution as a member of the Edith and Joy London Foundation management committee, established to manage the University's South Coast property, Kiola. For 25 years, Richard helped in the day-to-day management and maintenance of the property, and he played a leading role in saving the Deed of Gift for the University.

Since 1990 Dr Barwick has been a Reader in Zoology and continues to contribute to the University as a Visiting Fellow in the Department of Earth and Marine Sciences. Since his retirement, Richard Barwick has worked with Professor Ken Campbell, on Paleontology research that has been supported by ARC grants and is receiving international recognition.

The University is proud to present this award to Richard Barwick in recognition of his 45 years of exceptional dedication and outstanding voluntary contributions to the University.
